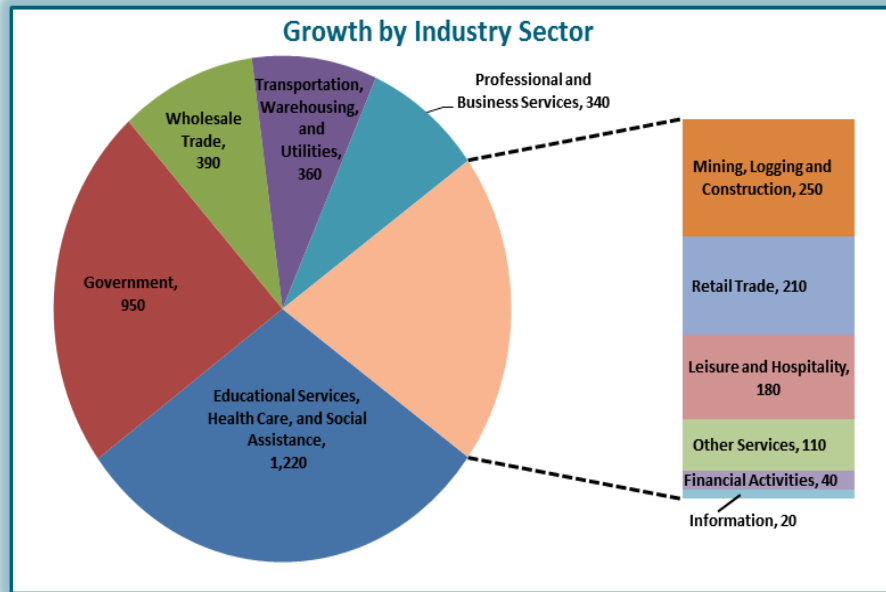


**Industry Employment**, which includes self-employment, unpaid family workers, private household workers, farm, and nonfarm employment in Colusa, Glenn, and Tehama Counties, is expected to reach 40,910 by 2022, an increase of 11 percent over the 10-year projections period. Eleven of 12 nonfarm industry sectors are projected to grow between 2012 and 2022.



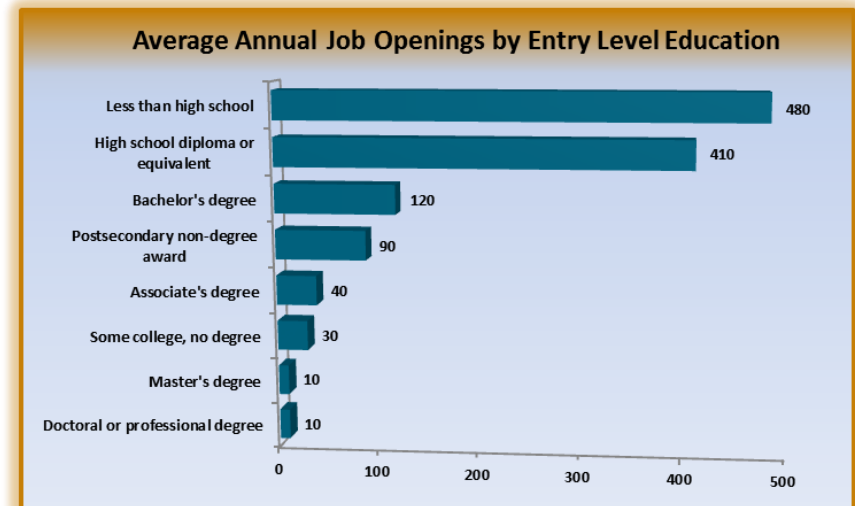
Total nonfarm employment is projected to grow by more than 4,230 jobs by 2022. Sixty-one percent of all projected nonfarm job growth is concentrated in three industries.

- Educational services, health care, and social assistance is projected to add the most jobs, adding 1,220 jobs due to expected population growth.
- Government is expected to add 950 jobs. Local government is expected to have the largest increase of 880 jobs and state government is projected to show a job growth of 20 percent.
- Wholesale trade is expected to add 390 jobs, an increase of 30 percent.

**Occupational Employment** forecasts 5,380 new jobs from industry growth and 8,680 job openings from replacement needs for a combined total of 14,060 job openings.

The 50 occupations with the most job openings are forecasted to generate 8,700 total job openings, which is 62 percent of all job openings. Farmworkers and laborers, crop, nursery, and greenhouse; and farmers, ranchers, and other agricultural managers account for 20 percent of the top 50 most job openings. These two occupations require a high school diploma or less with the majority of the job openings due to replacement needs. Higher-skilled occupations, requiring a bachelor's degree or higher, include elementary and secondary school teachers; general and operations manager; and accountants and auditors.

The fastest growing occupations anticipate having a growth rate of 11 percent or higher over the projection period. Sixty-eight percent of the fastest growing occupations require a high school diploma or equivalent or less. Occupations range from bartenders earning \$8.92 per hour to financial managers earning \$48.26 per hour.
